
Working Bees

Types of boots Cont.

Bandages:

Bandages are a universal style of boot designed to prevent injuries and support/protect horse's tendons and ligaments. Firstly, bandages can used as a form of a medical dressing should a horse endure a wound or splint. As it provides protection, comfort, and warmth - they can help prevent matters escalating. Secondly, bandages are highly popular for competition horses, especially dressage. Made from a soft, elastic material, they help warm up horse's legs to encourage optimum movement and flexibility.

Fetlock Rings

Similar to Over reach Boots, Fetlock Rings are a doughnut style ring that fits around a horse's fetlock. Constructed from a thick rubber band, a Fetlock Ring is designed to prevent over striding injuries or sores to the back of the front-fetlocks. Ideal for those horses who have a tendency of striking between the Coronet band and the ankle joint. A great tack-room addition for high-endurance exercising, during turnout or for green/young horses.

Wraps:

Wraps are a hybrid between brushing boots and bandages. Designed to fit similarly to bandages and provide the benefits of both styles, these are a highly popular style of boot for all horses. They are a great way to protect the tendons, ligaments and fetlocks during exercise and turnout. They're also a beneficial for reducing stiffness and swelling. With secure, snug fit, they prevent dirt from getting under the boot and causing irritation. Which means they're also an excellent way to keep your horse's legs cleaner. Offering flexibility and comfort, these are a fab option for all types of horses - competition, young, old, green or injured horses.

Quarter Horse

Origin - USA

The Quarter horse was originally bred as a stock horse to work cattle ranches in the USA. The name came from its use as a cowboy's holiday racer in the southeastern States of America, running over a distance of a quarter mile. It is now used in every sort of riding event.

The Quarter Horse breed probably started with an English thoroughbred stud, 'Janus', brought to the USA in 1750 and crossed with a Chicksaw Indian pony which was a descendant of the Spanish Conquistador's Arabian derivative. The breed was formally documented, and a stud register started in 1940, with the foundation sire, Wimpy P1.

The Australian Quarter horse started with the import purebred Quarter Horse to Australia in the 1950's by King Ranch (Texas USA). It is now an established breed. Continual imports have meant that Australian Quarter horses are of equal standard to any available in the world.

Essentially the Quarter Horse is best suited for Western Performance Shows which have classes designed to show the special qualities for which the horse was bred, but they are versatile and can perform in any field.

Syllabus of Instruction (Certificates) V's Grading

The information below is to provide an understanding of the difference between the Syllabus of Instruction and Grading.

Syllabus of Instruction

The Pony Club Australia Syllabus of Instruction is built on Certificate levels that enable the rider to continuously develop their skills in Riding, Horse Care and Citizenship. Members are encouraged to move through the Certificates at their own pace, but in the following order E, D, D*, C, C* or K, B, A.

Books for each Certificate can be purchased through your JustGo membership portal. These books are a fantastic way to improve your practical and riding ability through the Pony Club guidelines.

I recommend riders work through these books and when you complete a book, let me know so you can be assessed at a rally, passed, and then receive your certificate of completion. You will then be ready to move onto your next book.

Grading

Typically, Gradings are used for riders who compete, even if it's just a couple of times a year. If you are a rider who doesn't compete, gradings are also a terrific way to track how you and your horse are progressing as a combination (horse / rider).

Grading is an assessment of the horse / rider combination.

If you change horses, this is a different combination, and the grading process will start again.

When you are graded, you can be graded on a number of different disciplines and types of competitions. These are:

- Dressage only
- Show Jumping only
- Horse Trials Dressage, Show Jumping and Cross Country
- o Combined Training Days Dressage and Show Jumping

When you ask to be graded (ask your DC), the grading process will ensure you are competent in the disciplines you want to be graded in. This means you can successfully jump the height allocated to that grade and competently complete dressage. It's always best to start at the lowest grade and work your way up and remember, there's no hurry for you and your horse to move up the grades.

For most Disciplines / Sports, Grading starts at Grade 6 and works up to Grade 1, and then Advanced.

Show Jumping is the only discipline that starts at Grade 5 and works up to the Advanced level.

If you are unsure if you are ready to be Graded and / or at what level, it's always good to talk to the Instructors at Pony Club, or if you have a private instructor, talk to them too.


