December Rally





Horses need R & R too.

Just as you need your rest and sleep so does your horse.

Physical and mental rest is important for recovery for horses in training or those overcoming illness or injury.

Horses just don't need all their sleep at one time like you. In the wild, they had to be prepared to flee from predators. They generally don't sleep all night, and they might spend 2-4 hours a day dozing or napping, and can rest by standing montionless. They can do this because of a special system of tendons and ligaments which lock their major joints. They can rest on the ground in bother sternal (upright) and lateral (flat on side), as in photo.

Some things to remember:

- Equine friends make them feel safe enough to lay down and rest (There might be one awake and on lookout)
- If your paddock has a lot of rocks, you might need to clear a space or add some sand or soil for a sleeping spot
- Horses that have less sleep due to prolonged activities may see some health deterioration
- If your horse is stabled, you might need to allocate some quiet time for them to rest, usually at night (eg no traffic nearby, lawnmowers, loud radios)
- If your horse lays down for more than several hours, you may need to call a vet. Lungs, heart and intestines do not function well in down horses.

Horses can get 'cast' against a fence or stable wall. They may need help from an experienced person to roll them over and away from the barrier to allow them to get up.

Old horses may have trouble getting up, and may sleep more standing up.

Promoting good sleep and rest behaviour in horses ensures that you're giving your equines the opportunity to maintain and heal themselves whenever they need to.



Horse Breeds

Australian Stock Horse

Origin - Australia

The Australian Stock Horse, has been especially bred for Australian conditions. It is a hardy breed of horse noted for endurance, agility, and good temperament. Its ancestry dates to the arrival fo the first horses in Australia, brought from Europe, Africa and Asia. It is used today in a wide variety of disciplines, and is still valued as a working horse by stockmen and stockwomen throughout Australia.

Formal recognition of Australian Stock Horse as a distinct breed began in June 1971, when over 100 campdrafters and horse breeders met in Tamworth, NSW, to form the Australian Stock Horse Society. Many of these people bred stock horses using bloodlines tracing back to native stock, along with some Arabians, Thoroughbreds, and a few ponies of outstanding merit. Most of the early ASH registrations were of horses bred with bloodlines that excelled at both campdrafting and cattle work in the rugged Great Dividing Range.

The Stock Horse is bred for intelligence, courage, toughness and stamina. The horse will be sound, agile and quick moving with a sure-footed walk. It will have a calm, responsive temperament. All colours are acceptable. Heights ranges from 14 to 16.2 hands.



Pole Exercises

3a. Fan

Purple Route - A pole series on a circle develops the horse's agility, lateral suppleness and your guidance. Remember to look in the direction of movement and maintain impulsion towards the point on each pole where the horse will have the correct distance in relation to stride and pace. The horse should be flexed and bent in the direction of movement.


3b. Serpentine with fans

Blue Route - Place two or more pole series in succession but turned in different directions so that you can ride a serpentine. This exercise develops your control of the bending and flexing inside aids as well as the framing outside aids. It will also encourage you to quickly but softly change these between the pole series.

3c. Framing the fan

Green Route - If you have a problem with your horse pushing his shoulder out and ending up outside the poles at the end of the pole series, you need to put more effort into turning the horse with your seat and your outside aids. The inside aids should just be flexing and bending; don't start to pull strongly on the inside rein.

To assist you with the framing, you can place cones or cavaletti stands along the sides of the fan. The horse will then turn more independently, which will allow you to relax and follow and get the right feeling of how you and your horse are balanced through the turn.

Syllabus of Instruction (Certificates) V's Grading

The information below is to provide an understanding of the difference between the Syllabus of Instruction and Grading.

Syllabus of Instruction

The Pony Club Australia Syllabus of Instruction is built on Certificate levels that enable the rider to continuously develop their skills in Riding, Horse Care and Citizenship. Members are encouraged to move through the Certificates at their own pace, but in the following order E, D, D*, C, C* or K, B, A.

Books for each Certificate can be purchased through your JustGo membership portal. These books are a fantastic way to improve your practical and riding ability through the Pony Club guidelines.

I recommend riders work through these books and when you complete a book, let me know so you can be assessed at a rally, passed, and then receive your certificate of completion. You will then be ready to move onto your next book.

Grading

Typically, Gradings are used for riders who compete, even if it's just a couple of times a year. If you are a rider who doesn't compete, gradings are also a terrific way to track how you and your horse are progressing as a combination (horse / rider).

Grading is an assessment of the horse / rider combination.

If you change horses, this is a different combination, and the grading process will start again.

When you are graded, you can be graded on a number of different disciplines and types of competitions. These are:

- Dressage only
- Show Jumping only
- Horse Trials Dressage, Show Jumping and Cross Country
- Combined Training Days Dressage and Show Jumping

When you ask to be graded (ask your DC), the grading process will ensure you are competent in the disciplines you want to be graded in. This means you can successfully jump the height allocated to that grade and competently complete dressage. It's always best to start at the lowest grade and work your way up and remember, there's no hurry for you and your horse to move up the grades.

For most Disciplines / Sports, Grading starts at Grade 6 and works up to Grade 1, and then Advanced.

Show Jumping is the only discipline that starts at Grade 5 and works up to the Advanced level.

If you are unsure if you are ready to be Graded and / or at what level, it's always good to talk to the Instructors at Pony Club, or if you have a private instructor, talk to them too.


