



Types of boots

Open Front Tendon Boots:

Tendon boots are similar to brushing boots. However, tendon boots typically constructed from a hard-wearing shell for further protection and impact absorption. They are used for all types of riding and disciplines but are more commonly used for jumping. When jumping, there is a higher risk of the hind legs catching and striking the front legs over jumps. Open front boots are also preferred as it gives the horse more leg-to-pole awareness. Designed mainly to protect the horse's leg tendons, they also provide protection to the lower leg ligaments and fetlocks.

Over Reach Boots/Bell Boots:

Over Reach Boots, also know as 'Bell Boots', are designed to help prevent your horse over-striding with his back toes and clipping the back of their front hooves. Over reaching is a relatively common occurrence for horses; and is especially common during any form of jumping, during turnout or in muddy conditions. They help protect the back of the horse's front feet from being caught when over-striding, which can cause painful injuries and wounds. Over reach boots are usually made from rubber, however there are now many other materials, qualities and colours to choose from.

Brushing Boots:

Brushing Boots are highly popular choice when it comes to horse boots. But why? The lower part of a horse's leg is the place most prone to occurring injury or splints. A place where the tendon resides, this is a place that can easily be damaged during riding, exercise or turnout. These can be used on all four of a horse's legs to prevent knocks, scratches and bruises. Horses legs play a huge factor when it comes to purchasing or selling a horse, so it is best to try and keep a horses legs scar and injury-free by using brushing boots during any form or exercise. Brushing boots are popular for competition horses to ensure optimum performance and a clean appearance.

New Forest Pony

Origin - England

The New Forest Pony is one of the recognized mountain and moorland or native pony breeds of the British Isles. Height varies from around 12 to 14.2 hands ponies of all heights should be strong, workmanlike, and of a good riding type. They are valued for hardiness, strength, and sure-footedness.

Ponies have grazed in the area of the New Forest for many thousands of years, predating the last Ice age. Evidence from the skeletal remains of ponies from the bronze age suggests that they resembled the modern Exmoor pony. The earliest written record of horses in the New Forest dates back to the time, when rights of common of pasture were granted to the area's inhabitants. A popular tradition linking the ancestry of the New Forest pony to Spanish horses said to have swum ashore from wrecked ships at the time of the Spanish Armada. A genetic study in 1998 suggested that the New Forest pony has ancient shared ancestry with two endangered Spanish Celtic-type pony breeds, the Asturcon and Pottok. Today the New Forest pony and choice" for local farmers and commoners, as their surefootedness, agility, and sound sense will carry them (their rider) safely across the open Forest. New Forest ponies also are used today for gymkhanas, show jumping, cross-country dressage, driving and eventing.



POLE EXERCISES


Crisscross Part 3

SLALOM & CRISSCROSS

Green Route: Ride the slalom route over the zig zag poles and round the horses through every turn.

CIRCLES & FIGURE OF EIGHT

Blue route: Ride a circle through the box. Alternate by riding a figure of eight, by riding straight through the box and changing rein for the circle in the opposite direction. Keep alternating a few laps in the same circle with the figure of eight, to maintain your horse's attention.

Syllabus of Instruction (Certificates) V's Grading

The information below is to provide an understanding of the difference between the Syllabus of Instruction and Grading.

Syllabus of Instruction

The Pony Club Australia Syllabus of Instruction is built on Certificate levels that enable the rider to continuously develop their skills in Riding, Horse Care and Citizenship. Members are encouraged to move through the Certificates at their own pace, but in the following order E, D, D*, C, C* or K, B, A.

Books for each Certificate can be purchased through your JustGo membership portal. These books are a fantastic way to improve your practical and riding ability through the Pony Club guidelines.

I recommend riders work through these books and when you complete a book, let me know so you can be assessed at a rally, passed, and then receive your certificate of completion. You will then be ready to move onto your next book.

Grading

Typically, Gradings are used for riders who compete, even if it's just a couple of times a year. If you are a rider who doesn't compete, gradings are also a terrific way to track how you and your horse are progressing as a combination (horse / rider).

Grading is an assessment of the horse / rider combination.

If you change horses, this is a different combination, and the grading process will start again.

When you are graded, you can be graded on a number of different disciplines and types of competitions. These are:

- Dressage only
- Show Jumping only
- Horse Trials Dressage, Show Jumping and Cross Country
- o Combined Training Days Dressage and Show Jumping

When you ask to be graded (ask your DC), the grading process will ensure you are competent in the disciplines you want to be graded in. This means you can successfully jump the height allocated to that grade and competently complete dressage. It's always best to start at the lowest grade and work your way up and remember, there's no hurry for you and your horse to move up the grades.

For most Disciplines / Sports, Grading starts at Grade 6 and works up to Grade 1, and then Advanced.

Show Jumping is the only discipline that starts at Grade 5 and works up to the Advanced level.

If you are unsure if you are ready to be Graded and / or at what level, it's always good to talk to the Instructors at Pony Club, or if you have a private instructor, talk to them too.


